FINT goes to Dublin in 2016!

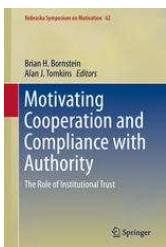
Don't forget to get ready to join us this November in Dublin for the FINT Workshop on Trust Within and Between Organizations.

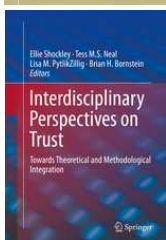


Nebraska Volumes on Institutional Trust from Interdisciplinary Perspectives
